




his project was one I instantly fell in love with—the style, location and the team," says Lindye Galloway, founder of Irvine-based practice Lindye Galloway Interiors. "With Brandon Architects and Patterson Custom Homes, it was a dream collaboration. We knew we could design something spectacular."

Nestled in the heart of Corona del Mar, this home with ocean views is the primary residence for a couple who wanted it to be a place to enjoy with their kids, grandchildren and friends. The owners' travels and East Coast traditional and Shingle style architecture inspired the aesthetics.

"We focused on blending the light and airy feel with architectural features, natural elements and soft touches throughout," Galloway says.

Decorated with neutral and blue hues mixed with various textures and patterns, the interior spaces are bright and airy. "We knew from the beginning stages that this house needed wood tones, for warmth, and marble, to bring a modern touch, as the grounding elements," the interior designer explains. These goals were met with the stained rift white oak island and



beams, as well as the marble slab on the kitchen island and mosaic patterns, among other elements. "Layering in a mixing of metals—from brass to polished nickel and matte black-really put the finishing touches on each room's design."

In the dining room, two Carmen chandeliers by Made Goods in natural coco beads combine with woven rope dining chairs, and artwork on the wall and the two blue armchairs from Lee Industriesplaced on each side of the custom-made tablebring pops of color. The cozy living room-which opens to the front patio and private courtyard via a retractable door-features a fireplace anchored by floating shelves.


"The biggest challenge ended up with the best

outcome," notes Galloway. "The first floor has an open concept with that great room feel, so it was tricky when designing the ceiling treatment to decide on location as well as style. We ended up doing box beams with tongue and groove in the kitchen and dining area to link those spaces. Our decision to use custom stained beams in the living room defined the space, making it visually its own while still being connected to the overall."

The den; master bedroom, which comprises a sitting area and opens to a private balcony; master bathroom with a freestanding tub by Victoria & Albert; guest bedrooms; and a rooftop with an outdoor kitchen are located upstairs.
