Basic Barnhouse Becomes Western Chic

Builder Andrew Patterson (pattersoncustomhomes.com) is based in Newport Beach, but he and his wife, Shannon, designed a country retreat for their family in the Santa Ynez Valley. As an overflow space for visitors, they put up a two-story, 40-by-40-foot barn. Upstairs are bedrooms and a living-dining area, but downstairs it's all fun and games. Foosball and pool tables and a dart board generate activity around a rustic chic bar that serves as a central conversation hub. Red cedar siding sets the western tone, which is underscored by views of the landscape through the huge doors. Contemporary low-backed stools and glass shelves lend a modern vibe.

1 Red cedar siding on the walls and ceiling has a warm, natural look and a fresh scent.

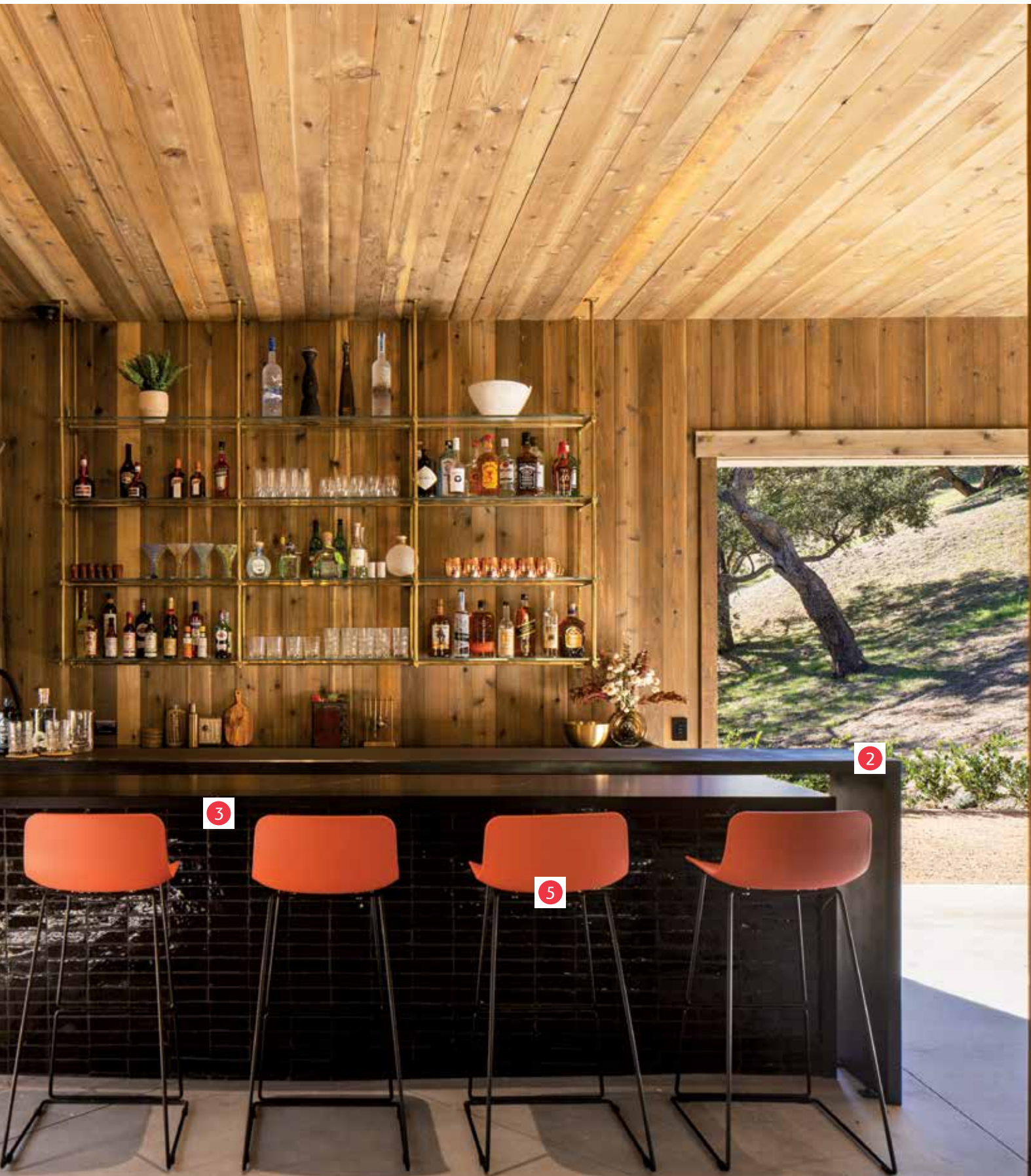
2 The waterfall bar top is one piece of steel with a cantilevered edge.
